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A WORD FROM THE REGISTRAR

Since joining BPEQ, I have prioritised engagement with our stakeholders, most importantly RPEQs. RPEQ's have until 27 February 2017 to complete the survey.

Another way BPEQ has engaged with engineers is through the registration roadshows and the Queensland Government's Building Plan consultation – which BPEQ has been involved in. A recurring issue BPEQ's legal team have encountered lately is the issue of electronic signatures. Unauthorised use of a RPEQ's signature is fraud and can carry significant penalty.

Electronic signatures will be the basis of this month's legal discussion.

UNAUTHORISED USE OF SIGNATURES ON CERTIFICATION DOCUMENTS

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It is important to remember that third parties often rely on a RPEQ's signature as absolute evidence of the engineering services having been undertaken by a RPEQ in a professional and competent way.

An issue, for which BPEQ is receiving increasing notifications, is the allegation of unauthorised use of RPEQ signatures on (among other things) designs and certification documents. The most common (but not only) examples relate to Forms 15 and 16 under the Building Regulation 2006.

While there are numerous scenarios, the allegations frequently involve the attachment of a RPEQ's signature (either digitally signed or 'scanned and snipped') to documents by persons other than the RPEQ, without the knowledge, consent or authorisation of the RPEQ. It also appears common there may be some pre-existing professional relationship between the alleged perpetrator and the RPEQ, through which the person who attached the RPEQ's signature obtained a copy of it (e.g. from a previous certification or similar).

BPEQ consider that this type of conduct is very serious with potential catastrophic consequences.

CRIMINAL OFFENCES

Where RPEQ signatures are used without authorisation, it is possible that a number of offences are committed against the Criminal Code and the PE Act.

BPEQ has and is continuing to liaise with the Queensland Police Service (QPS) about the seriousness of this type of conduct.

The QPS has the jurisdiction to investigate any offences against the Criminal Code, and BPEQ has jurisdiction to investigate offences against the PE Act. There are both current Police and BPEQ investigations in relation to these allegations.

Where BPEQ receives a notification of unauthorised use of a RPEQ's signature, BPEQ notifies the QPS. BPEQ will recommend to the RPEQ whose signature has been fraudulently used that they make a formal complaint to the QPS, which is a requirement in relation to most

Criminal Code offences.

BPEQ will also decide whether to investigate any potential offences against the PE Act, which may apply in some circumstances.

A perpetrator may be subject to prosecution under both the Criminal Code and the PE Act.

PROTECTIVE MEASURES

The best possible solution is the avoidance of this issue in the first place. This can be challenging in the current electronic environment and with the increasing use of electronic rather than 'wet' signatures.

While there are currently no easy or conclusive solutions, there are a range of protective measures that can be used. These will inevitably evolve over time and ideally, the issue may be resolved by way of a standardised protocol, whether technological or practice based.

In the meantime, the key issue is for RPEQs to retain control of their signature to the extent possible and to maintain detailed and secure records in relation to any activity to which they have certified by way of signature. In essence, RPEQs should be in a position to identify with certainty any engineering tasks and certifications in which they have (and have not) been involved and the nature and extent of that involvement.

The following are relevant considerations:

1. Be highly protective of your signature and RPEQ title. Maintain an awareness of the possibility that RPEQ signatures may be used without your authorisation.
2. Never provide to any person any authority to attach your signature to any document without your express and, preferably written, authorisation.
3. Never allow any person out of convenience or convention to form a practice or belief that they can use your signature or RPEQ title without your express authorisation, regardless of the urgency or alternatively routine nature of the matter.
4. Maintain comprehensive records in relation to all engineering jobs to which you have been involved and provided any certification for, including details of design versions.



5. If possible, introduce a unique reference system in relation to any signatures that you apply to certifications.
6. Ensure that your contact details on the BPEQ register are current so that any person or entities wanting to confirm any matter, including BPEQ, can immediately contact you.
7. Ensure that your records are in a format that is reliable, accessible and portable, so that you have a record of jobs undertaken even after you leave an organisation.
8. If you become aware of the possibility that your signature has been used without your authorisation, take immediate action including obtaining independent legal advice, making

a complaint to the QPS and notifying BPEQ. If you believe that there is a possibility that the unauthorised document may have been relied on by another party or entity, consider advising that party or entity.
